## *A Word From Our Rector*

*“The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord’s favor.”*

*Luke 4:18-19*

In the midst of the great upheavals in our society: politically, theologically, economically, the Church dares one more time to call her people to be “stewards of the mysteries of Christ.” This exciting and challenging time of the year calls all Christians to look deeply into the generosity of God, and into the caring, supportive nature of our individual ministries.

When I was a child, each Saturday evening my parents would give me a small amount of money to put “in the collection plate, when it comes by.” As I grew older, I found that I was able to place some of my own hard-earned income on the alms basin, as part of my understanding on what a good steward was supposed to do in celebrating Christ in our community. I wasn’t sure about percentage giving, or even about tithing, but I did know that “all good gifts around us are sent from heaven above,” and it was my bounden duty as a member of the Church to give back a portion of what I could.

Our text from the gospel according to Luke has Jesus beginning His ministry by reading from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah, and reminding the people of God, that the Spirit of the living God was ready to reach out to His creation. The sense that a deeper understanding with one’s world could only be undertaken by the intimate relationship of the believer with the Creator was the gift of salvation offered to those who gathered in that synagogue in Capernaum, so many centuries ago.

Luke reminds us that in Jesus’ day, the liturgy of the synagogue had become a formally organized service of praise and thanksgiving. It included readings from the law (Torah), and then the prophets.

Any circumcised Jewish adult male could preach, and Jesus was invited by His neighbors to do just that. They wanted to hear the teaching which was causing Jesus' star to rise. However, the Lord made some significant adjustments to the prophet's words, especially when Isaiah wrote: "to heal the broken hearted," probably because Jesus refused to work cures in Nazareth. Jesus came not to be some kind of sideshow miracle-worker, but rather to usher in the kingdom of God. "A year of favor from the lord," is a joyfully heartening note. It recalls the famous Jubilee Year decreed in Leviticus (25:8-55), for every seven years, amounting to a universal declaration of bankruptcy. All debts were wiped out; all possessions seized in loan defaults were to be returned to their original owners. God justifies this declaration by reminding the people, "All land is mine, and you are aliens."

It comes as no surprise that Jesus' audiences responded with joy and wonderment, at His message. The kingdom of God was and continues to be good news. What upset some of Jesus' hearers was that their lives would be changed from the preconceived notions that they had somehow "arrived" and were to be admired for what they had acquired, and not for who they were in the world.

When my class of students entered seminary some forty years ago, we were thinking that we wanted to be priest, and that we would then fit into the well-trodden path of clergy who had been leaders in the Church for centuries. You can imagine our surprise when we were directed to write and then state our goals about *ministry*, not the priesthood! Our pre-conceived notions at what seminary meant for us, were shattered, as we learned to rethink our response to our vocations, and just where those new thoughts might take us in our journey.

Stewardship is much like that change in our thinking. Yes, we know this topic as the three "T'S", time, Talent, and Treasure, however, we are called also to remember that our journey in faith changes, as do our thoughts on ministry change. As stewards of the mysteries of Christ, we are called to be open to new and dynamic ways to teach, preach, and live the good news. Even in a culture which seems so misguided in its financial affairs, and demands easy answers, which fit into sound-bytes, we are called to actually wrestle with

the image and imagination of God in text and deed. If there were no clergy around, would we be able to preach and make God's word effective for friends and neighbors?

Stewardship allows us, to once again examine our spiritual and physical lives. In this examination we are directed to be hearers of God's Word, and then to act on it, as givers of time, talent, and treasure. Our ministry is to live into our baptism, as those who not only respect the dignity of every human being, but to also seek and serve Christ in all persons, as we love ourselves and our neighbors. Stewardship all comes back to ministry.

This ministry lends itself to be constantly re-invented to reach out in a new expression of God's love. When Jesus spoke to the congregation in the synagogue, at Capernaum, so many years ago, He challenged then—just as He challenges us to recognize that we are stewards of God's creation. Allow this time of stewardship to be a time for us to be a time for us to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ, as true ministers of the His Word, wherever He may lead.

# *All that we had heard with our ears...we practice in our daily lives*



God established a time for making his promises and a time for their fulfillment. The time for making his promises extended from the prophets to John the Baptist; and the time for fulfilling his promises, from John the Baptist to the end of the ages. God, who is faithful, has made himself our debtor, not by receiving anything but by promising such great things.

It was a very small thing to make promises, so he even wished to bind himself in writing, as it were giving us a contract of his promises; in order that when he should begin to carry out his promises we would be able to discern in the Scriptures the order for the fulfillment of the promises. Hence, the time of prophecy was the time for the foretelling of the promises, as we have mentioned more than once.

He promised eternal salvation, everlasting happiness with the angels, and unfading inheritance, endless glory, the joyful vision of his face, his holy dwelling in heaven, and after our resurrection from the dead the assurance of no further feat of death. This is (so to speak) his final promise toward which all our intentions should be focused; for when we have reached it, we shall require nothing more not demand anything further.

Furthermore, our Lord also manifested in his promised and prophecies the way in which we would arrive at our final goal. He promised humans divinity, morals immortality, sinners justification, the poor a rising to glory. Whatever he promised, he promised to those who were unworthy, so that it was not a case for reward being promised to workers but of grace being given as a gift as its name indicates.

But, my beloved, because God's promises seemed impossible to us — equality with the angels in exchange for mortality, corruption, poverty, weakness, dust, and ashes — God not only made a written contract with us to win our belief, but also established a mediator of his good faith: not a prince or angel or archangel, but his only Son. He wanted, through his Son, to show and give us the way he would lead us to the goal he has promised.

It was not enough for God to make his Son our guide to the way; he made him the way itself that you might travel with him as leader, and by him as the way. Therefore, the only Son of God was to come to us, to become human, and in this nature to be born as one of us, to die, to rise again, to ascend to heaven, to sit at the right hand of the Father to fulfill his promises among the nations; and after that to come again, to exact now what he had asked for before, to separate those deserving his anger from those deserving his mercy, to execute his threats against the wicked, and to reward the just as he had promised.

All this had to be prophesied, foretold, and promised as an event in the future so that it would not inspire fear by coming suddenly but would be believed in and expected.

# Stewardship Events 2011



“Now concerning the collection for the saints: you should follow the directions I gave to the churches of Galatia. On the first day of every week, each of you is to put aside and save whatever extra you earn, so that collections need not be taken when I come. And when I arrive, I will send any whom you approve with letters to take your gift to Jerusalem. If it seems advisable that I should go also, they will accompany me.”

*I Corinthians 16:1-4*

Well, it is that time of the year again—Stewardship Season. As the years roll by, it seems to come sooner every year, or so it may seem. Actually, “stewardship” is the ongoing work of the Church, to manifest the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ to the world.

This year, in spite of the many financial woes besetting our world, we are called to look at this ministry, and celebrate being stewards, as **“Saints Alive! Living Generously.”** Our program this year will be more low-key than in past years, acknowledging our recent construction and the fact that our facility is changing from week-to-week. This would be a better way to celebrate our common life together, primarily by our gathering at the altar each weekend, and by mail.

Our “Stewardship 2011” will begin in earnest on October 9th as we will hear the first of three talks, offered during the weekend liturgies, as we will hear the laity offer their reflections on their ministry of Time, Talent, and Treasure. This will be reaffirmed in the preaching during the services, as the clergy will weigh-in on the lessons for the day. There will be two stewardship mailings, followed by the mailing of the Pledge Card for Year 2012.

“Loyalty Sunday,” will be on All Saints’ weekend, November 5 and 6, when we will have the opportunity to present our pledges for the New Year, as part of our commitment to Christ and His Church.

As you can see, our stewardship ingathering will be different this year, but our Year 2011, has been different as we are looking ahead to a completed building program early in the Spring, and the prospect of reaching out to more who wish to call Saint Augustine of Canterbury their spiritual “home.” Pray for our good work, as we pray for the continuing presence of the Holy Spirit, who imbues us with His love and grace in Jesus’ Name.

## Pet Blessing

Our annual Blessing of the Pets will take place on Sunday, October 2, 2011, at 1:00 pm, in the courtyard in front of the Parish hall.

All parishioners are welcome to bring their pets for this service of thanksgiving for the gift and joy of all those committed to our care. The Holy Eucharist will be offered on three additional Holy days, during the month of October, as we continue our journey in faith as we continue in autumn.



We will celebrate the life and ministry of St. Luke, physician and evangelist, on Tuesday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, with the liturgy at 10:00 am. The patron saint for those in the medical field and the healing arts, Luke's caring and tender writing in the New Testament offers us insight in the Gentile mindset of the early Christian community. James of Jerusalem will be remembered on Monday, October 24<sup>th</sup>, also at 10:00 am, during the Holy Eucharist. By tradition, James is recognized as the first bishop of Jerusalem, and was instrumental in the settling of the dispute between Peter and Paul. It was James' sense of fairness and caring that allowed Peter to continue his work among Jewish-Christians in Israel, while Paul was able to reach out to those who were called to Christ from the Gentile world—outside of Israel. Friday, October 28<sup>th</sup>, will see us remember the "lesser" apostles, Simon and Jude, also at the 10:00 am service.

Come and hear the stories of these heroes of the early Christian community, as they sought to learn their identity in Christ, as evangelists to the world.

## Episcopal Election News

The candidates for the election of the Fourth Bishop of the Diocese of Central Florida were announced on September 15, 2011.

The names of the candidates are: the Very Reverend Gregory Brewer, Rector, Calvary and St. George Church, New York City; the Very Reverend Anthony Clark, Dean of the Cathedral Church of St. Luke, Orlando, Florida; the Reverend Jonathan Davis, Vicar of the Church of the Incarnation, Oviedo, Florida; the Very Reverend Charles Holt, Rector, St. Peter's Church, Lake Mary, Florida; the Reverend Timothy Nunez, Rector, Church of St. Mary, Belleview, Florida; the Reverend Mary Rosendahl, Rector, Church of the Nativity, Port St. Lucie, Florida; and the Reverend James Sorvillo, Rector, Church of the Ascension, Orlando, Florida.

The election is set for Saturday, November 19, 2011, at the Cathedral Church of St. Luke, in Orlando. The Diocese will descend upon the Cathedral for Eucharist, prayer, and to vote for our new Chief Pastor, as Bishop Howe has already announced his intention to retire in April of 2012. Our Rector, Father Michael, along with our delegates for this election, James and Nancy Kelly, and John Schutt will be in Orlando that day for the election.

We have been asked by Bishop Howe to keep the candidates, and our whole Diocese in our prayers, as we seek God's will for our mission in this part of the kingdom. The Standing Committee and the Bishop recommend this prayer to be used:
