## *A Word From Our Rector*

*“Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.”*

Matthew 2:2 (NRSV)

No sooner does the Church get into the celebration of the birth of God’s only-begotten Son, than we are presented with the story of the Wise Men coming from the East to visit the Holy Family in their home.

With the arrival of the Magi, our Christmas story comes to a close, and the new season of the Epiphany begins. The “Epiphany,” or the Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles, as the 1928 version of the Book of Common Prayer referred to this feast, was the opportunity for the evangelist, Matthew, to tell the Jewish/Christian readers that the Christ-Child came for the entire world’s redemption. In answering his Gentiles critics, Matthew allowed that the “good news” of Jesus Christ was open for all men and women.

The universality of the Gospel is not a message to be lost in our own day and age. There are those who wish to hold the people of God hostage because they seem to have a hold on one version or another of the “truth.” The author, Bruce Feiler, in his book, *Abraham: A Journey to the Heart of Three Faiths*, challenges us to be more “modest” when we are confronted with the Word of God. The Magi, who were believed to be astrologers, sought the new king of the Jews because they had read in the stars that this new person would alter all of humankind. The Word that had been spoken at the beginning of creation was now made into the very material of our humanity and the relationship between God and that same humanity would never be the same.

The Epiphany is the reality that God now has entered human history in a way that is different than at any other time in existence. God will no longer be kept in possession by humanity, but rather He possesses us. In the arrival of the Wise Men we are given an opportunity to enter into the wonder of God’s mighty action.

We don’t celebrate “wonder” very well in our lives. We are still caught up in the empirical method of research, wherein we have to always be able to “prove” our theories and hypotheses, beyond any shadow of a doubt. Wonder is something that children still have, but

adults seem to have outgrown this fact of life. We have forgotten the sense, or lost the gift, of wonder—and yet we still need it! Wonder is what allows children to believe in fairy tales and to discover the truth behind the fantasies. Wonder creates hours of imaginary play that proves that time is a beautiful gift.

Wonder shows children that there is no such thing as ugliness—there are only people who see ugly things. However, as adults, we know that these gifts of wonder are a waste of time. They cannot be proven scientifically and you can't earn a living from them. Yet, if there is anything that this time of Incarnation and Epiphany can teach us, as the Church, it is

that time of wonder over God's greatest act of entering our history. It is in wonder that faith begins to grow. It is our faith as well as our imaginations that must be ready to move with the Lord, no matter how or where He reveals Himself.

When the Wise Men called out, seeking the Child who was born to be King of the Jews, it was more than a nationalistic surge of pride from Matthew's pen, it was the clarion call that God no longer would simply rely on surrogates to carry His message to His humanity. He would send out His Son. By sending His Son to reach out to us, God invites us

to share in all the wonder and joy that a child would have at receiving that "special gift" from a relative. That special gift is the gift of God's love. We are called to accept it; by accepting it, we will receive a greater force than we have ever experienced before.

With the coming of the Magi we are gathered with the Holy Family in that home in Bethlehem. We gaze in wonderment, as each of the kings drops off his treasure of gold, frankincense, and myrrh—what do these gifts mean if not to cause each of us to wonder "What Child is this?"

## “We Three Kings of Orient Are!”

The loving providence of God determined that in the last days he would aid the world, set on its course to destruction. He decreed that all nations should be saved in Christ.

A promise had been made to the holy patriarch Abraham in regard to these nations. He was to have a countless progeny, born not from his body but from the seed of faith, His descendants are therefore compared with the array of the stars. The father of all nations was to hope not in an earthly progeny but in progeny from above. Let the full number of the nation now take their place in the family of the patriarchs. Let the children of the promise now receive the blessing in the seed of Abraham. In the persons of the Magi let all people adore the Creator of the universe; let God be known, not in Judea only, but in the whole world, so that his name may be great in all Israel.

Dear friends, now that we have received instruction in this revelation of God’s grace, let us celebrate with spiritual joy the day of our first harvesting, of the first calling of the Gentiles. Let us give thanks to the merciful God, who has made us worthy, in the words of the Apostle, to share the position of the saints in light; who has rescued us from the power of darkness, and brought us into the kingdom of his beloved Son. As Isaiah prophesied: *The people of the Gentiles, who sat in Darkness, have seen a great light, and for those who dwelt in the region of the shadow of death a light has dawned.* He spoke of them to the Lord: *The Gentiles, who do not know you, will invoke you, and the*

*peoples, who knew you not, will take refuge in you.*

This is *the day that Abraham saw, and rejoiced to see,* when he knew that the sons born of his faith would be blessed in his seed, that is, in Christ. Believing that he would be the father of the nations, he looked into the future, *giving glory to God, in full awareness that God is able to do what he has promised.*

This is the day that David prophesied in the psalms, when he said; *All the nations that you have brought into being will come and fall down in adoration in your presence, Lord, and glorify your name.* Again, *the Lord has made known his salvation; in the sight of the nations he has revealed justice.*

This came to be fulfilled, as we know, from the time when the star beckoned the three wise men out of their distant country and led them to recognize and adore the King of heaven and earth. The obedience of the star calls us to imitate its humble service: to be servants, as best we can, of the grace that invites all men to find Christ.

Dear friends, you must have the same zeal to be of help to one another; then, in the kingdom of God, to which faith and good works are the way, you will shine as children of the light: through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with God the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen.
