## A Word From Our Rector

*For to us a child is born,  
To us a son is given;  
And the government will be upon his shoulder,  
And his name will be called  
“Wonderful Counselor,  
Mighty God, Everlasting Father,  
Prince of Peace.”*

*Isaiah 9:6*



Can't you just hear the strains of the choir singing this anthem, from Handel's, *Messiah*? The power and the majesty of the Advent season literally lifts the human spirit, as we hear this familiar music throughout the month of December—or at least until Christmas Day!

We can go on and on about the commercialization of Christmas and how we're losing sight of the “reason for the season,” and other well-meaning cliches designed to make us feel guilty that we aren't doing enough to keep “Christ in Christmas.” And you may be right.

However, the greatness of this piece of music is firmly rooted in the Holy Scripture, that part of the Bible dedicated to the life and ministries of the prophets. The prophet Isaiah, with his people being persecuted and threatened with extinction from the soon-to-be-conquering Babylonian hordes, offers a glimpse of hope for the horror-struck people of Judah. An anointed one, a messiah, will be born in Judah, and of His kingdom there will be no end. This messiah will be fed on milk and honey, the food of celebration for those loyal to the Lord God of the Hebrew people. This prophecy was to offer a new world view for those seeking to be part of the people of God—a people who held to the relationship they shared as a community of faith.

One of the real gifts of Hebrew prophecy is that it is open-ended: it spoke not only to the immediate religious/political needs of Israel, but also looked ahead to the coming of a new way of living in God's life for His people. Judah was a nation that was under siege. They had seen the northern kingdom of Israel trampled and conquered by the nation of Assyria in 721 B.C., and with the conquering of Assyria by Babylon, it was just a matter of time before the people of Judah

would have their lives changed, possibly forever, by this powerful military force from what is now modern day Iraq. Then, as now, the people looked to their leaders to give them guidance, to make the deals, to provide the necessary tribute money, in order to keep the current lifestyles of the nation without any interference from outside forces.

Our world seems so tied to the political and financial struggles of the present time. We have come through a devastating couple of years in which families have been terribly disrupted due to the financial policies of some who could only see their own sense of control as paramount. We have experienced a bruising political season wherein the nation called out for change, and is praying that “the common man” will finally be heard.

And then along comes another Christmas! With this winter festival, more than another other in the Church Year, we look for the perfect celebration which will cause us to be uplifted and give us the hope for the New Year coming. Many times that hope is dashed, as we realize that our expectations rise higher than can possibly be chieved.



Enter the church, as we look back on that time when the word of God brought forth a new understanding of what it means to live into the presence and love of God.

However, we are called to first listen — listen to the cry of the prophets, who spoke not only to the immediate needs of the people, but to coming of the heavenly kingdom by which all things will be made whole and healed. This healing nature of God’s presence is no more prevalent than in the familiar text quoted above. The God we worship and adore is so enraptured by His creation that He will not let us fall away from His love. This is reason for Isaiah to stay so strong in his prophecy in that all that is beautiful all that is lovely, will be offered to humanity to gaze upon and humbled that God would care. In God’s divine providence He desires so much as to want to keep the relationship going forward in spite of our attempts to supplant God with ourselves.

The prophetic voice continues

throughout Advent, as we are drawn back to God in that mysterious web of caring love and righteousness. “Come back to me,” could easily be the call of the Creator, who merely wants all that is good for us, and to remain in relationship with Him, and He with us. Allow this Advent to be not only a time of preparation, but more especially a time for us to return “home” to that place where we are loved, and always have place at the Lord’s Table. There is a tune from the Simon and Garfunkel songbook that says simply: “Home, where my thoughts are ‘scaping, / Home, where my music’s playing, / Home, where my lovelight’s waitin’, silently for me.”

May God’s lovelight shine for us in the darkness of the difficulties of this life, and draw us into the kingdom, where the Prince of Peace offers us comfort, hope and love.

## *Come Thou, long-expected Jesus!*

Patience is a precept for salvation given us by our Lord, our teacher: “Whoever endures to the end will be saved.” And again: “If you persevere in my word, you will truly be my disciples; you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.”

We must endure and persevere if we are to attain the truth and freedom we have been allowed to hope for; faith and hope are they very meaning of our being Christians, but if faith and hope are to bear their fruit; patience is necessary.

We do not seek glory now, in the present, but we look for future glory, as Saint Paul instructs us when he says: “By hope we were saved. Now hope which is seen is not hope; how can we hope for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it in patience.” Patient waiting is necessary if we are to be perfected in what we have begun to be, and if we are to receive From God what we hope for and believe.

In another place the same Apostle instructs and teaches the just, and those active in good works, and those who store up themselves treasures in heaven through the reward God gives them. They are to be patient also, for he says: “Therefore while we have time, let us do good to all, but especially to those who are of the household of faith. But let us not grow weary in doing

good, for we shall reap our reward in due season.”

Paul warns us not to grow weary in good works through impatience, not to be distracted or overcome by temptations and so give up in the midst of our pilgrimage of praise and glory, and allow our past good deeds to count for nothing because what was begun falls short of completion.

Finally the Apostle, speaking of charity, unites it with endurance and patience. “Charity,” he says, “is always patient and kind; it is not jealous, is not boastful, is not given to anger, does not think evil, loves all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.” He shows that charity can be steadfast and persevering because it has learned how to endure all things.

And in another place he says: “Bear with one another lovingly, striving to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.” He shows that neither unity nor peace can be maintained unless we cherish each other with mutual forbearance and preserve the bond of harmony by means of patience.

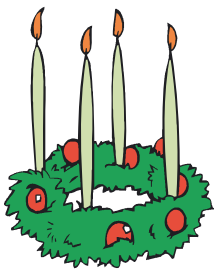

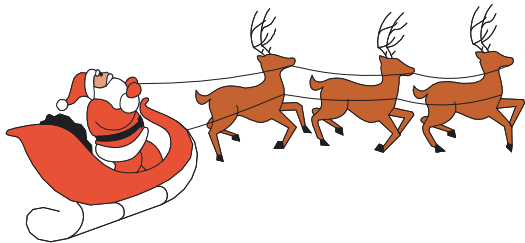
We invite all lectors, lay readers, and chalice-bearers to join us as we set out the schedule for this most blessed and holy time of the Church Year.

## The Pops Fund Report

### POPS Appeal Goal: \$5,000

We are now beginning holiday season festivities and many charitable organizations are appealing for donations. Our own **POPS Fund** is unique to St. Augustine and it was started in 1995 by an anonymous benefactor who has pledged to donate \$10,000 every year in memory of his father. The benefactor named the fund "POPS" for two reasons: (1) He received an inheritance from his father, whom he called "Pops" and (2) based on the words in the Gospel when Jesus told the people of Nazareth to "tend to the Poor, the Oppressed, the Prisoners and the Sick". The restrictions on the use of the funds include helping people only within Indian River County, that each donation be for a specific expenditure, rather than on a continuing basis and the gifts should be closely monitored.

Over the past few years, the POPS Fund has assisted many worthy organizations that you may have heard of: *The Source, Homeless Family Shelter, Samaritan Homeless Family Center, Abilities Resource Center, Redlands Christian Migrant Association, Childcare Resources, Dasie Bridgewater, Gifford Youth Activity Center, Our Father's Table Soup Kitchen, St. Peter's Academy, Life for Youth Camp and the Indian River Correctional Institute.*

We are pleased to announce that we made our goal of \$5,000.00 for the year, and our benefactor matched that with another \$5,000 for the upcoming cycle. We are most grateful to our benefactor, as well as to all who have given so generously to the POPS Fund, as we seek to continue Christ's work in this part of His kingdom. For those still wishing to contribute for Year 2011, there are POPS Envelopes available in the narthex, as well as in the parish office. Again, our thanks to all during this season of giving from the heart.



## Church School

Coming off the celebration of All Saints' Sunday in November, our Church School is preparing for the Advent Event, on December 3<sup>rd</sup>, and the Children's Mass, on Christmas Eve, December 24<sup>th</sup>.

The Advent Event is not only open to the young people of the Church School, but for whole parish as well. So mark the date: Friday evening, December 3<sup>rd</sup>, at 5:30 pm, and be a part of the throng to come and greet Saint Nicholas, as we enter into the Advent season.

On Friday evening, December 24<sup>th</sup>, Christmas Eve, the Church school will once again be presenting the Christmas Pageant as part of the Children's Mass. The young people of our Church will gather for the 5:30 pm liturgy for the first Eucharist of the Christmas season. Following the service, the Church School will be hosting their annual Christmas party, and all are welcome to attend.

As this Advent dawns, come and join us for the walk of faith that will lead us through the lives of the prophets, through the lives of two cousins, Elizabeth and Mary, and follow the light of the Star which will bring us to Bethlehem, and the celebration of the birth of Jesus the Son of God.



## Church School and Girl Scout Troop 50451 Join together to help the needy.

The Church School and Girl Scout Troop 50451 put together 6 large food baskets for Father Mike to give to needy families within and outside of our parish. In the large laundry-sized baskets are all the ingredients that will allow a family to have a wonderful Thanksgiving turkey dinner. The baskets contain non-perishable foods and the turkeys will be provided by a local service club. We also put together 40 plastic shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child and will be dropping them off on Monday, November 15, so they can be delivered in time for Christmas. Over 8 million children received shoe boxes since 1993 in over 130 countries through the Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization. In their mission statement, their goal is "to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to needy children around the world and, together with the local church worldwide, to share the Good News of Jesus Christ."

Our gifts ensure that each child will receive at least one gift at Christmas, and we are hoping to be able to reach out to them to school again this year. Can you help?

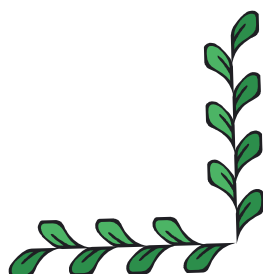


### YOUTH WORK TEAM COOKIE WALK

Items given to the shelter at Safe Space for women and their children who have experienced domestic violence were 6 quilts, 8 blankets, and 4 afghans. The Source, a center for the homeless and near-homeless, received 3 blankets, 14 throws, 3 afghans, and 3 quilts. We were also able to provide them with a woman's quilt jacket, knit vest, and ladies winter coat, as well as 2 blanket snugglies, 2 ladies sweaters, 3 warm jackets, and 2 bags of miscellaneous clothing and shoes. A check in the amount of \$55 was forwarded to Church World Service. We will all enjoy the holiday season knowing our contributions helped make life a little better for our needy neighbors.
