A Word From Our Rector

*"..rend your hearts and not your
clothing. Return to the Lord, your God,
for he is gracious and merciful, slow to
anger, and abounding in steadfast love."
Joel 2:13(NRSV)*

The traditional lesson from the Hebrew Scriptures from the Book of the prophet Joel follows the word spoken by one who was attached to the Temple worship of the Jews. His prophecy was one which called the people back to the cult of worship which allowed for the nation to rectify its walking away from their faith.

What Joel attempted to do in his preaching was to remind the people that they were a worshipful people, and that they had a special relationship with God the Creator. However, this relationship was something that was not earned by humanity, but rather was instituted by God, as found in the opening chapters of Genesis. Having created humanity in His image, God initiated the love relationship with us and lifting us to His presence — God is always lifting us up; not us bringing God down.

Israel lost sight of this image. As she grew more prosperous as a nation, Israel felt she was the mistress of her fate and gave away her soul to worldly pursuits. The prophetic voices of Jeremiah, Isaiah, Amos, Joel and others called first the United Kingdom of Samaria and Judah; and then Judah, alone to repentance and humility back to her God. Thus, when Joel preaches to the people, he is calling the people back to the inner conversion of their lives — not merely to "go through the motions" of outward religious observance.

We are called as a religious people to walk humbly with our God, the One who brought us into life and hope and peace. The first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, is that graphic reminder of

where we are in our spiritual journey. The mark of the ashes on our foreheads is the outward and visible sign of the Christian entering into a sacred and, at times, exhausting, time of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The fear, though, is the same fear that plagued Joel's message to Israel—don't let our faith merely become an outward show of religiosity, but rather a change in one's inner life as well.

Almsgiving, prayer and fasting are beneficial and worthy responses to God's grace only when they are part of intimate, unfeigned fellowship with God—the God of our Lord Jesus Christ who died for us. On Ash Wednesday this God calls us to "return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping and with mourning, and rend your hearts, and not your garments."

How is this relationship lived out if not within the household of the community? It begins, first, with the belief that God does indeed love us. With that as our foundation, we then are able to build on that love by returning it with the conscious the deliberate understanding that in God we are able to love from the heart. In both the Hebrew Scriptures and in the writings of the New Covenant, we are called to love God and our neighbor. This type of loving comes from the experience of knowing that one is loved, and that in giving love we are doing something as natural as breathing itself.

This unconditional loving, *chested* in the Hebrew, and *agape* in the Greek, is the hallmark of those who are called to rejoice in the God of Abraham. In expressing this type of love we enter

into a relationship that is more than the sentimental feelings of a soap opera or made-for-TV movie. We enter into the very heart and presence of God. He is the source of our being and our ability to love. The cynics and the pundits would mock this type of spirituality in that it is too Pollyanna or too unreal, but the disciple and the journey during Lent, asks us to enter into an unreal world wherein we are led into the very actions of a God who is love personified. Enter then, dear friends, into this time of prayer, fasting and almsgiving; enter into a time wherein we are called to run counter to the culture of the superficial; and come to where God truly meets us on His terms: love given freely to all. Come and allow the loving God to bring us to healing and mercy.

There were some manuscripts and texts written in the early Church, which chronicled excerpts from the life of Jesus, which were not included in the New Testament. Some of these will be offered by Tony during this talk. Lockwood Rianhard will make his presentation on February 25th, discussing "A Comparison on the Torah and the New Testament." “Remember that You are Dust!”

There are three things by which faith stands firm, devotion remains constant, and virtue endures. They are prayer, fasting, and mercy. Prayer knocks at the door, fasting obtains, mercy receives. Prayer, mercy, and fasting: these three are one, and they give life to each other.

Fasting is the soul of prayer, mercy is the lifeblood of fasting.

Let no one try to separate them; they cannot be separated. If you have only one of them or not all together, you have nothing. So if you pray, fast; if you fast, show mercy; if you want your petition to be heard, hear the petition of others. If you do not close your ear to others you open God's ear to yourself.

When you fast, see the fasting of others. If you want God to know that you are hungry, know that another is hungry. If you hope for mercy, show mercy. If you look for kindness, show kindness. If you want to receive, give. If you ask for yourself what you deny to others, your asking is a mockery. Let this be the pattern for all when they practice mercy: show mercy to others in the same way, with the same generosity, with the same promptness, as you want others to show mercy to you.

Therefore, let prayer, mercy and fasting be one single plea to God on our behalf, one speech in our defense, a threefold united prayer in our favor.

Let us use fasting to make up for what we have lost by despising others. Let us offer our souls in sacrifice by means of fasting. There is nothing more pleasing that we can offer to God, as the psalmist said in prophecy: “A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit; God does not despise a bruised and humbled heart.”

Offer your soul to God, make him an oblation of your fasting, so that your soul may be a pure offering, a holy sacrifice, a living victim, remaining your own and at the same time made over to God. Whoever fails to give this to God will not be excused, for if you are to give him yourself you are never without the means of giving.

To make these acceptable, mercy must be added. Fasting bears no fruit unless it is watered by mercy. Fasting dries up when mercy dries up. Mercy is to fasting as rain is to the earth. However much you may cultivate your heart, clear the soil of your nature, root out vices, sow virtues, if you do not release the springs of mercy, your fasting will bear no fruit.

When you fast, if your mercy is thin your harvest will be thin; when you fast, what you pour out in mercy overflows into your barn. Therefore, do not lose by saving, but gather in by scattering. Give to the poor, and you give to yourself. You will not be allowed to keep what you have refused to give to others.

Pancake Supper

February 16th, Shrove Tuesday, will see us celebrate “*Mardi Gras*” with a pancake supper beginning at 5:30 pm in the parish hall. *Mardi Gras* or ***Fat Tuesday*** is viewed as the last great day of feasting revelry before the “Great Fast” of Lent, beginning the next day, on Ash Wednesday (In a time when the Lenten fast was more strictly observed, the idea that all animal fat needed to be purged from one’s home) caused all bacon, sausage, butter, and even lard to be consumed before Lent began. Pancakes became the sign and vehicle by which the fat of the meat was absorbed, and then eaten.

A sign-up list will be in the narthex for those wishing to attend. Just sign-in and come join us. A free-will offering will be taken.

A reminder.. please bring your dried palms from last year’s Palm Sunday and we will burn them and use the ashes for Ash Wednesday. Just bring your palms and leave them in the parish office.



The First Day of Lent



On Wednesday, February 17, 2010, will see the Western Church celebrate the First Day of Lent, better known as Ash Wednesday.

We will offer three services on this day, at 10:00 am, Noon Day, and at 7:30 pm. The morning and evening services will be the Proper Liturgy for Ash Wednesday, which will include the imposition of ashes and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. Our service at noon will consist of the Great Litany and Noon Day Prayers and will also include the imposition of ashes as part of our worship.

All are invited to attend as we begin this most holy season. Do come and join us, as we begin our journey in faith as Lent approaches. Ashes will be distributed at all services on this day. If there are shut-ins who may wish communion on that day, please notify the parish office at your earliest convenience so that we might minister to all on this special holy day.

Rules for Fasting

One of the more frequently asked questions during Lent is simply, “what constitutes a “fast?””

The Book of Common Prayer provides that there are two official days for fasting, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On both of these days it is a reminder, for those who can healthily observe this practice, to control the quantity and quality of food on those days. Usually on these days one fasts until they have received Holy Communion. They are then able to eat a light meal, usually refraining from meat, with one main meal on that day.

Another practice has been to refrain from eating any meat on Wednesdays and Fridays of Lent as a sacrifice of our usual life-style. The money saved from a simplified meal on these days was many times deposited in a Lenten “mite-box.” The sacrificial offerings would then be presented on Easter for the benefit of those less fortunate.

These are just some musings as we prepare to enter Lententide.

The Annual Meeting of Saint Augustine of Canterbury Episcopal Church

The Annual Meeting of Saint Augustine of Canterbury Episcopal Church was held on Sunday, January 24, 2010, following the 10:00 celebration of the Holy Eucharist, in the parish hall. Following a delicious brunch offered by the women of the Episcopal Churchwomen, the Daughters of the King and the Altar Guild, Father Michael called the meeting to order with opening prayers. Vestry Member Harry Halbert then presented the slate of nominees for the Vestry and the Delegates for the 2011 Diocesan Convention. The slate was: Timothy Marvin, William Sherman, and Gina Slobodzian for Vestry, and Gloria Pinkston, James and Nancy Kelly, for Delegates to the Diocesan Convention. With no other nominations from the floor, the Secretary cast the ballot for the slate.

Our Treasurer, Philip Wright, then presented the Financial Report for Year 2009 and the Budget for Year 2010. Phil's report held that in spite of the weak economy, the giving in our parish has continued to hold strong, in support of the budget and the work of mission in Saint Augustine's. This year's Budget is \$545,500, and with expenses pegged at \$545,348, there will essentially be a balanced budget for the New Year. Phil went on to explain the Finance Committee Report, and to highlight that with the improving market, our resources have also gone up, and with a cautious market year ahead we might hope for a continued sense of growth as well. Outgoing Senior Warden Gloria Pinkston thanked all who made the past year such a time of fellowship and support. We then had a report from Tony Marshall, a member of the Vestry as well as the Finance Committee, on the topic of "Planning Giving." This was a continuation of Tony's presentations at some of last Fall's Stewardship Meetings, wherein we were given direction, if not tools, on how to build a program for the support of the local parish church. It was during his presentation, that Tony also spoke concerning the setting up of a building committee to investigate the need and possibility of an expansion of the current church. The Rector then spoke concerning the direction of the parish for the upcoming year, while also acknowledging the previous year's accomplishments, and losses. Father Michael continued Tony's discussion, and spoke about the need for an expansion. With our Church School cramped for space, as well as other organizations which use the building for their meetings, it was felt that expansion is certainly a strong option. A building committee has been formed, and there will be more information to be delivered as the year goes forward.

The Rector then continued in thanking those who have made the ministry of Saint Augustine's that much stronger during the past year, with special emphasis on the role of the women in the parish. After thanking the Daughters of the King, and the Episcopal Churchwomen for the reception at this year's Annual Meeting, Father Michael praised the music program, and especially the work of Dr. Betty Hare, and continuing good work of Dr. Iris Tapley, who took over Betty's role as choir directress in May. Bunny Frey then spoke to amplify the work of POPS Fund, and to point out that this year's report is more detailed than usual, as it shows, specifically the several organizations which have been helped by the fund.

The meeting ended with acknowledgment and gifts presented to the outgoing members to the Vestry, Gloria Pinkston and Burke Neely, amid the reminder that the Celebration of the New Ministry of Father John Jacobs at Trinity Episcopal Church was later to be held in the afternoon. The meeting was then adjourned.



Confirmation Classes

Beginning on Tuesday evening, February 9, 2010, and continuing for the next twelve weeks, we will be conducting Confirmation and Inquirer's Classes for those desiring to be confirmed, received, or to reaffirm their baptismal vows when the Bishop comes for his visitation.

The Right Reverend John W. Howe, D.D., Bishop of Central Florida will be at Trinity Episcopal Church on Sunday, May 9, 2010, to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation, for the Southeast Deanery. Due to the increased schedule of the Bishop he is doing a regional confirmation this year in Vero Beach,

The Confirmation Class will meet at 7:00 pm, in the library, and is open to young people who have the desire, and their parents' permission, to be confirmed. The Inquirer's Class will meet at 8:00 pm, also in the library, and is for all adults who not only wish to be confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church, but also to use the course as a "refresher" on the tenets and history of the Church. With all that has gone on in the Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion, this might be a wonderful time to attend this year's Inquirer's group. Next class date: February 9, 2010, come join us!!
