A Word From Our Rector

“Then he said to his disciples, “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.”

Matthew 9:38

At a secret meeting of Connecticut clergy in Woodbury on March 2, 1783, the Reverend Samuel Seabury was elected to be the first bishop of the neophyte, non-affiliated Anglican entity of the Church of England in America. It took Seabury almost two years to be consecrated a bishop, partially due to the fact that the former British colonies in America had recently separated from the Mother country and that Seabury “did not even own a carriage” to ride to Lambeth Palace for his visit with the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The consecration of Samuel Seabury was eventually accomplished by three bishops of the Scottish Episcopal Church on November 14, 1785, with the provision that the Scottish Rite of Holy Communion be included in the new American Book of Common Prayer. Seabury agreed to this proposal and brought that back to the United States, along with his rather irascible temperament, in the founding of this version of the Church of England adapted to the American shore. It was Seabury’s strength of character, if not his own dogged personality, which allowed the episcopacy to become a part of the American Anglicanism.

As part of the Church of England’s ordination rites, the candidate, whether a deacon, a priest, or a bishop had to swear allegiance to the Crown. However, because citizens of the United States had only one allegiance, and that was to the laws and political structures of this newly independent country, ordination in England was deemed impossible. The Scottish Episcopal Church had no such problem with the King of England. Their clergy had refused to pledge themselves to the “foreign king and queen from, Germany, “ in the seventeenth century, and survived as a national Anglican non-observant, or non-juror Church in the British Isles. Their openness to

the candidate bishop-elect, and his subsequent consecration, flies in the face of Episcopal elections held in the Episcopal Church in America ever since.

During this month of November, we in the Diocese of Central Florida, are faced with the election of our fourth bishop. It is a process that, with participation of the clergy and the laity, will allow the Diocese to gather in a special convention to elect someone to stand in the line of many who have been called to lead the people of God.

Our text from Saint Matthew's account of the Gospel shows Jesus at the end of a particularly trying day, in one which He was fatigued from preaching, healing and simply "walking-about" visiting with those who were included as part of the kingdom. The synoptic writers of the Gospel refer to that scene as Jesus surveying the situation, as "sheep without a shepherd". It was into this mix that Jesus remarks to the disciples, "the harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Jesus is offering the image of the good

shepherd, a theme elaborated by the evangelist John, as He reflects on the pastoral ministry in drawing the people into a stronger sense of community.

When candidates ask search committees and other concerned laity and clergy what are they looking for in a bishop, most seek a pastor—one who will connect with the various parishes of the given diocese. The gift of the episcopacy to the Church is just that a gift. As in any gift, it becomes the responsibility of both giver and the receiver to put that gift to good use. The episcopate is the creation of the Church (not the other way around) and the Church—which is all of us as the people of God—is challenged to put the gift to work for the God's greater glory. Our responsibility is to direct the talents and energies of those elected to be bishops, to seek not their own will but the will of those who elected them and the One who called the bishop to ministry in the first place. We are all called by virtue of our baptism to present Jesus Christ to the

world, in all four orders of ministry. Our testimony is such that the episcopate evokes our sense of stewardship. We need to measure prayerfully and rather shrewdly the resources that these men and woman who feel called to stand for election in Central Florida.

May our prayers for each of these candidates be offered as a reminder of the irascible nature of Samuel Seabury, who refused to be defeated in his quest to fulfill his call bestowed by his constituents through the power of the Holy Spirit. May the blessings of Our Lord Jesus Christ be upon our delegates and clergy as they seek to elect one more to stand in the line of the Apostles, to be a good shepherd for God's people.

“Called to be a Bishop and Shepherd of the People”

I shall show in what respects the apostles were, and all duly authorized clergymen now are, Ministers of Christ.

The authority under which the apostles acted being derived from Christ, in the exercise of it, they were his ministers, because the authority was originally and properly his, and they could act only in his name. And this authority brings, by successive ordinations, continued down to this day, all duly authorized clergymen now act by it, and are therefore “the ministers of Christ.”

The commission given by our Savior to his apostles just before his ascension, as it is recorded by St. Matthew, is in these words: “All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you always even unto the end of the world. Amen.” Which may be expressed in the following manner: “Behold, in the execution of this commission I will, by my spirit and power, be present with you and your successors, even unto the consummation of all things.”

On this commission is the authority of ministers in Christ’s church founded, and no man can justly claim any power in spirit matter but as it is derived from it. No one will now pretend to have received his commission to preach the gospel immediately from Christ, as the eleven apostles had theirs; and none but enthusiasts will pretend to be empowered for that work by immediate revelation from heaven, as St. Paul was. It remains then, that there is no other way left to obtain a valid commission to act as Christ’s minister, in his church, but by an uninterrupted succession of ordinations from the apostles. Where this is wanting, all spiritual power in Christ’s church is wanting also; while they, who have any part of this original commission communicated to them, are properly Christ’s ministers, because they act in his name and by authority derived from him.

All duly authorized clergymen are “the ministers of Christ,” as they are the appointed rulers and governors of his church, under him the supreme and all powerful head.

One branch of that fullness of power which was given to Christ in heaven and earth, was to be the head of the church, which is stilled in his body. This implies the power of instituting its government, enacting its laws, and appointing its governors to preside over it and regulate its economy, during his absence. That he did exercise this power and did delegate it to his apostles and their successors, just before his ascension into heaven, is plain from the words of that commission he gave them. If he was to be with his apostles “even unto the end of the world,” their successors must have been included in the promise, for the apostles continued not beyond the ordinary term of human life.

In St. John’s gospel, the commission of Christ to his apostles is thus introduced, “As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you.” As, therefore, he under the power of the Father sent his apostles to be the governors of his church, so he gave them power under him to send others with the same power of governing and sending, in order to perpetuate the succession of apostolic powers to the end of the world.

From ecclesiastical history it appears that the government and officers instituted by him do continue in their successors at this present time, notwithstanding the utmost force of persecution which the malice of evil men and wicked spirits could bring upon it. Though in some places veiled in poverty and obscurity, in others encumbered with worldly pomp and ceremonious superstition, the church of Christ still continues in the world preserved by his providence, who promised that “the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.”

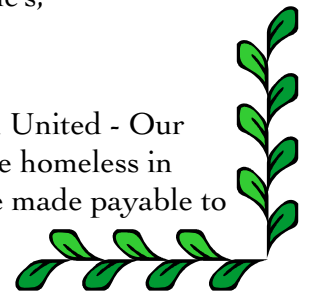
Church Women United 2011

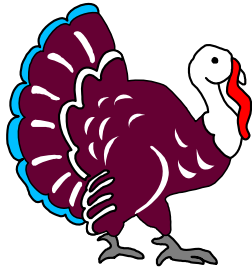

November will see us celebrate holy days that have become unique to this special time of the year. Episcopal Election in Central Florida

The special convention to elect the Fourth Bishop of the Diocese of Central Florida is set for Saturday, November 19, 2011, at Trinity Preparatory School, Winter Park, beginning with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist at 9:30 am.

The Diocese has undergone a study of its wants and needs in the role of the new chief pastor for Central Florida, ever since Bishop Howe announced his intention to step down as our Diocesan during his convention address this past January.

The candidates for election are: the Very Reverend Gregory Brewer, Rector, Calvary and St. George Church, New York City; the Very Reverend Charles Holt, Rector, St. Peter's Church, Lake Mary, Florida; the Reverend James Sorvillo, Rector, Church of the Ascension, Orlando; the Reverend Mary Rosendahl, Rector, Church of the Nativity, Port St. Lucie, the Reverend Timothy Nunez, Rector, Church of St. Mary, Belleview; the Very Reverend Anthony Clark, Dean of the Cathedral of St. Luke, Orlando, and the Reverend Jonathan Davis, Vicar, Church of the Incarnation, Oviedo.

Further information concerning the election process can be found on the website, <http://bishopsearch.cfdiocese.org>. We have been asked by Bishop Howe to keep the candidates and the whole Diocese of Central Florida in our prayers, as we seek God's will for our mission in this part of the kingdom.

We were especially touched by the stories and memories some in the parish shared with us about a friend or loved one who took their own life. This is not an easy subject for any of us to talk about, but suicide is not a secret. We believe that by bringing it "out of the darkness", many suicides can be prevented.

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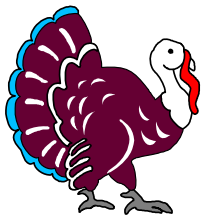

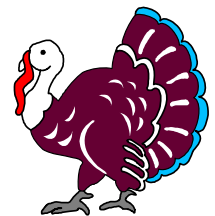
